As most of you will know by now, Rev. Anita has resigned as our minister and is taking up a new path as Chaplain/Music Care Specialist at Durham Christian Homes, Seniors' Housing and Long-Term Care. At coffee time on her last Sunday, people expressed their appreciation of Anita, especially her pastoral care, her Bible Study leadership and her thoughtful Sunday services. Anita was presented with a gift of Chimes of Tuscany (wind chimes) and a bouquet of flowers. We sincerely wish Anita God's blessing in all the future holds for her.

Now what...

Session elders will be doing what needs to be done to ensure the wellbeing of UPC. We will be doing this with the support of Oak Ridges Presbytery, who will appoint an interim moderator to help to guide us going forward. On April 8th, Session will be meeting with Presbytery Pastoral Relations for the customary "exit interview". We should have an interim moderator by that time.

As well, the departure of the minister will change our 2025 budget from that which was presented and voted on at our AGM. We are awaiting figures on some specific costs from Presbytery to finalize numbers. The changes will not have a negative impact on our bottom line. When the final new proposed 2025 budget is ready you will receive it, and it will need congregational approval.

Rev. Anita kindly ensured our pulpit supply for the month of April. This will be one of the roles of our interim moderator once appointed. Here is the schedule we have at this time.

Blessing of Reset

My 80-year-old mother was recently diagnosed with atrial fibrillation. After four nights stay at the NYGH, Mom was released after the cardiologist performed a procedure called cardioversion.

"Cardioverison is where we give her heart an electrical shock which will reset her heartbeat so hopefully her heart rate can go back to the norm again...", hearing the phrase "electrical shock to the heart" was scary but the doctor explained it is for a very brief second, not even a second. With my medically trained brother who quickly gave his opinion to go ahead with the procedure, Mom was sedated and came out of the procedure room quite quickly and released from the hospital the next day.

Throughout the whole ordeal, Mom was calm and did not complain of any discomfort, even though she was short of breath with a heart rate of 150 to 160. She did not show a sign of fear or anxiety, "I will never leave you or forsake you" (Joshua 1:5) anchored her. Mom was confident that the God who took care of her last time when she fell on the icy road resulted in a concussion with internal bleeding in her brain will again watch over her. Being her main caretaker, between home, mom's place and the hospital, I was full of energy and confidence, my heart was at peace and my mind was clear, I too, did not dread. I knew this is another test, another opportunity to glorify God by giving a testimony once Mom is released from the hospital.

What a God we believe in! Not only is He alive and real, He is also a giver of second chances. A reset, a new opportunity, a new chance. A reset is a gift! Don't we all need a reset in so many aspects throughout our lives! Our lives are filled with resets from the moment we wake up in the morning, and yet we often are too apathetic to recognize our blessings. As Christians, the moment we accept Jesus Christ as our saviour is a new beginning, we are given a new life, an eternal life. Our sins are wiped out at that particular second, but more mercifully, we are forgiven again and again throughout our lives as we are blessed with uncounted second chances.

Even though it was less than two years ago when UPC was looking for a new minister, we are now given another blessing of reset to start anew again. We give thanks to God.
